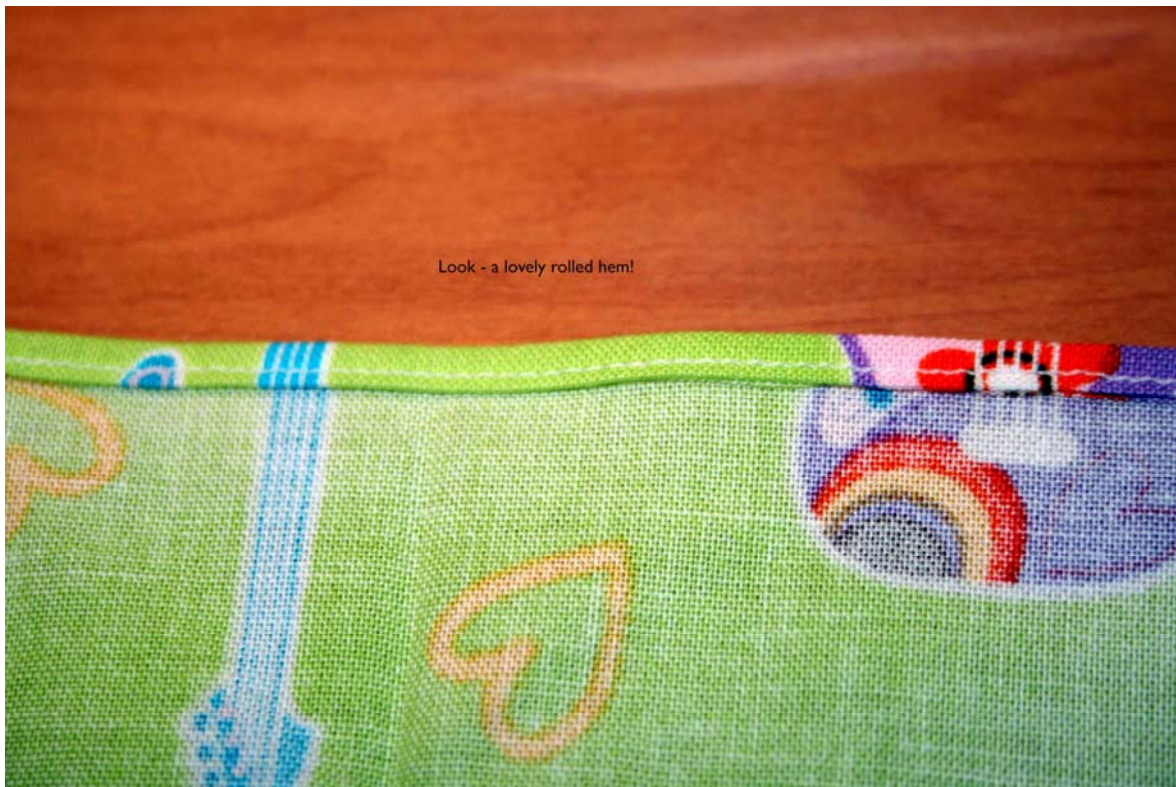




# Miffy's That's How We Roll...

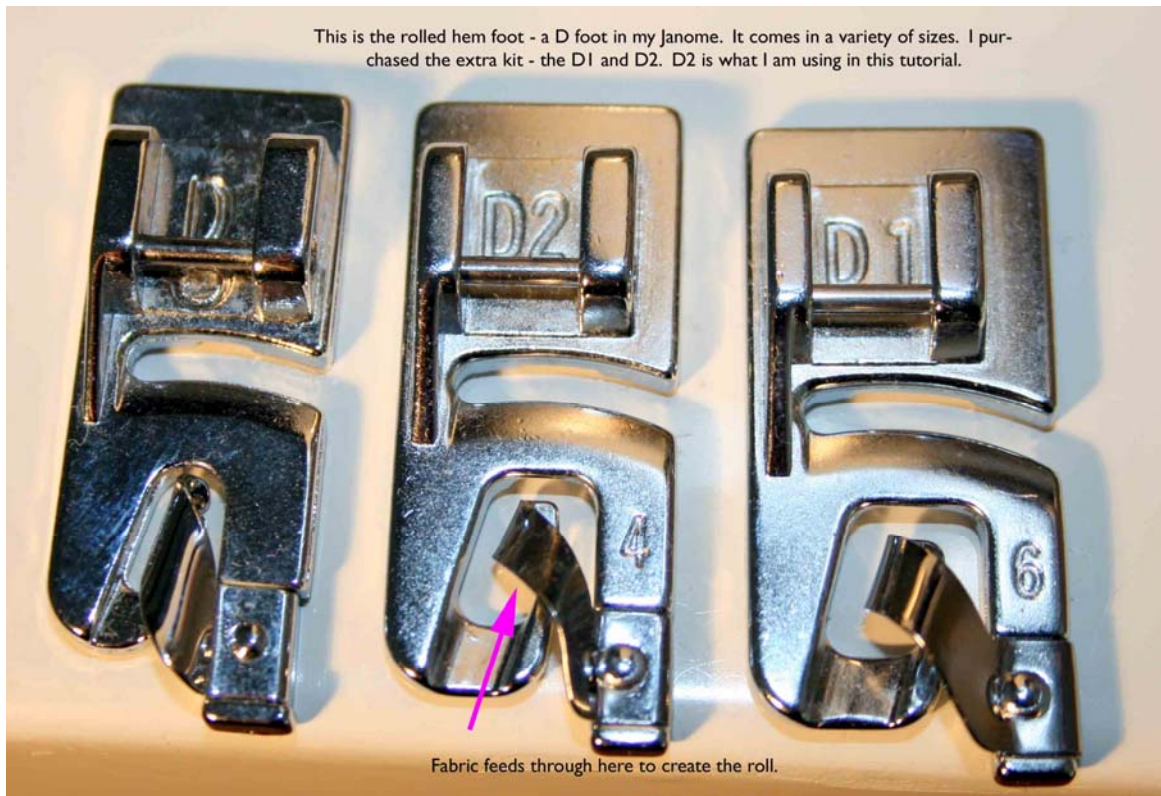

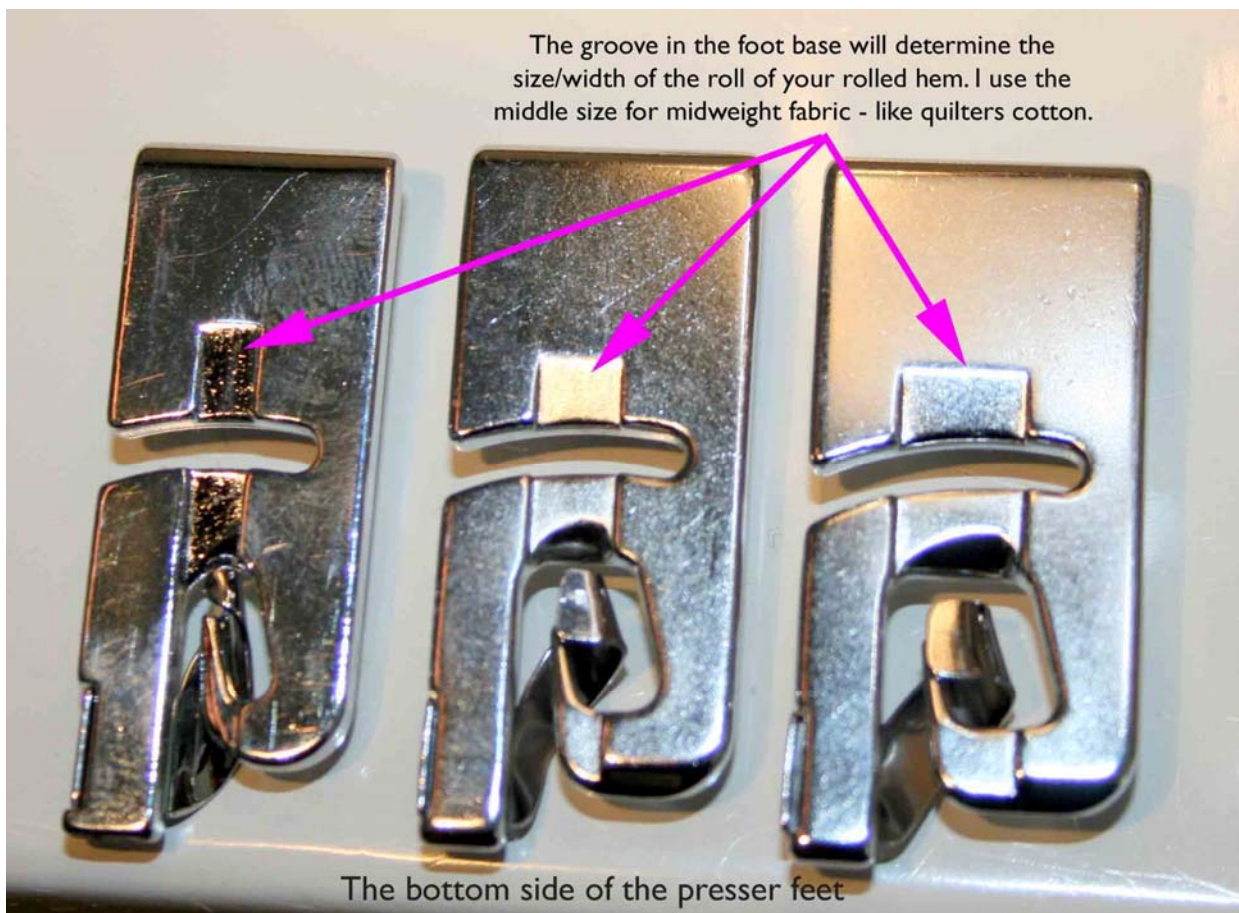

## Step 1

### The Foot – upside and underneath

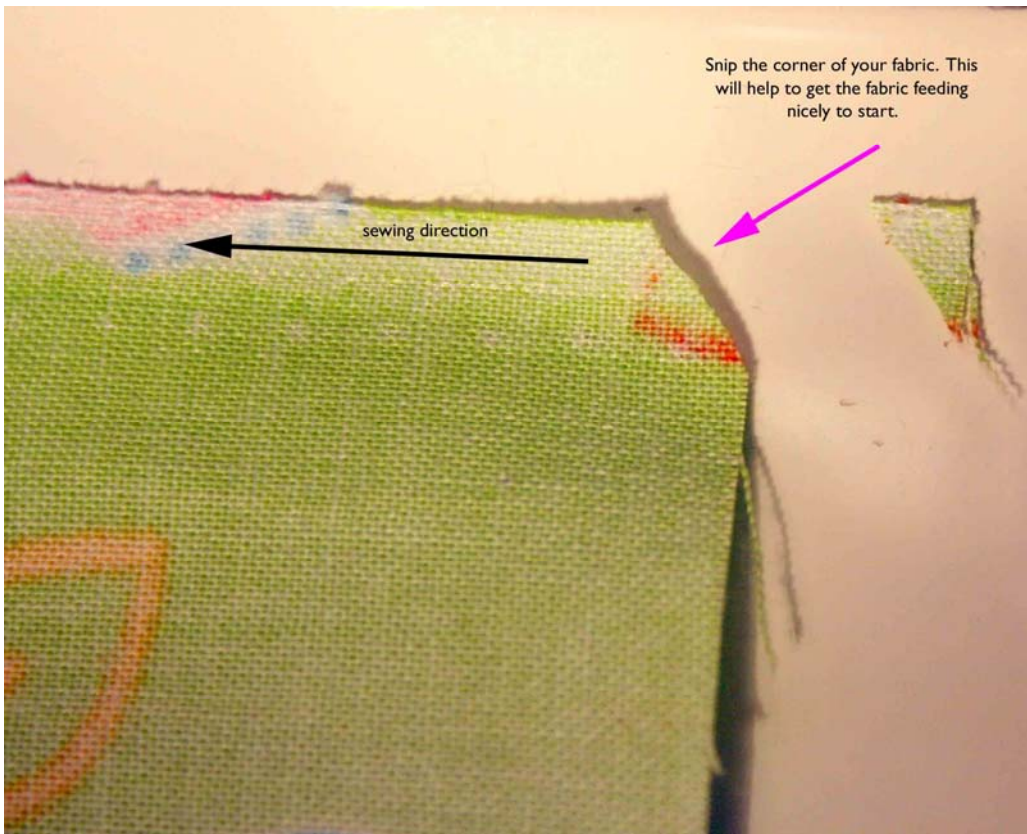


And here is the under or bottom side. The groove as highlighted in the picture is what determines your hem size.



## Step 2

Snip the corner off your fabric. This sounds odd – but worthwhile as you will see in the next step. The snip is only about  $\frac{1}{4}$ " or  $\frac{1}{2}$  cm.



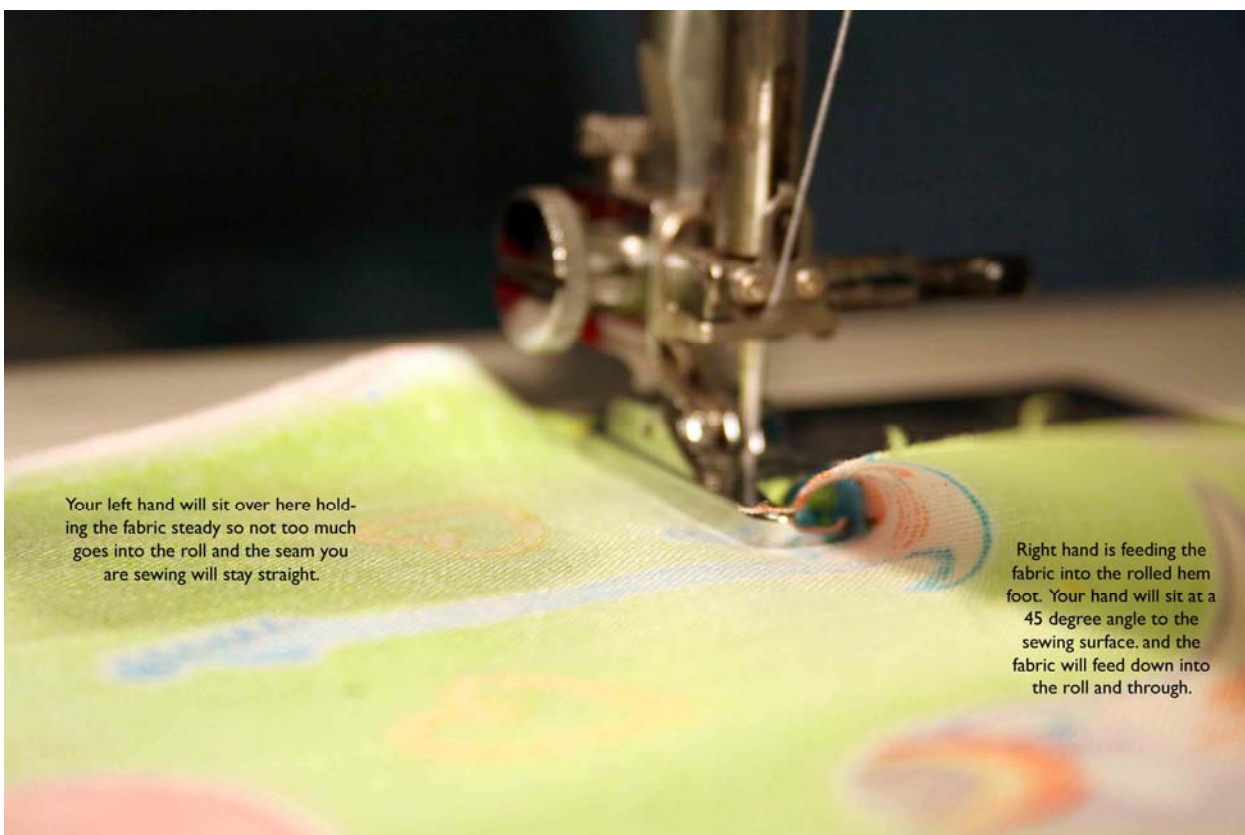
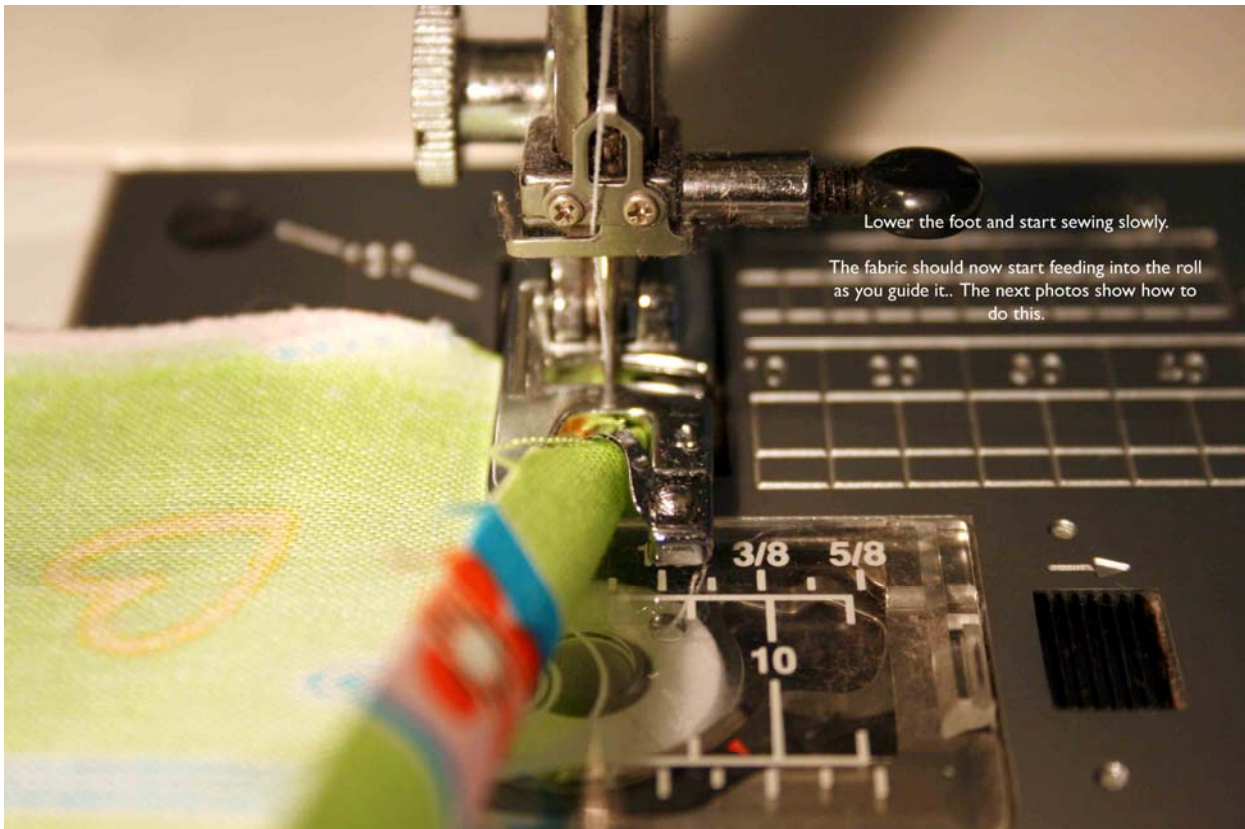
## Step 3

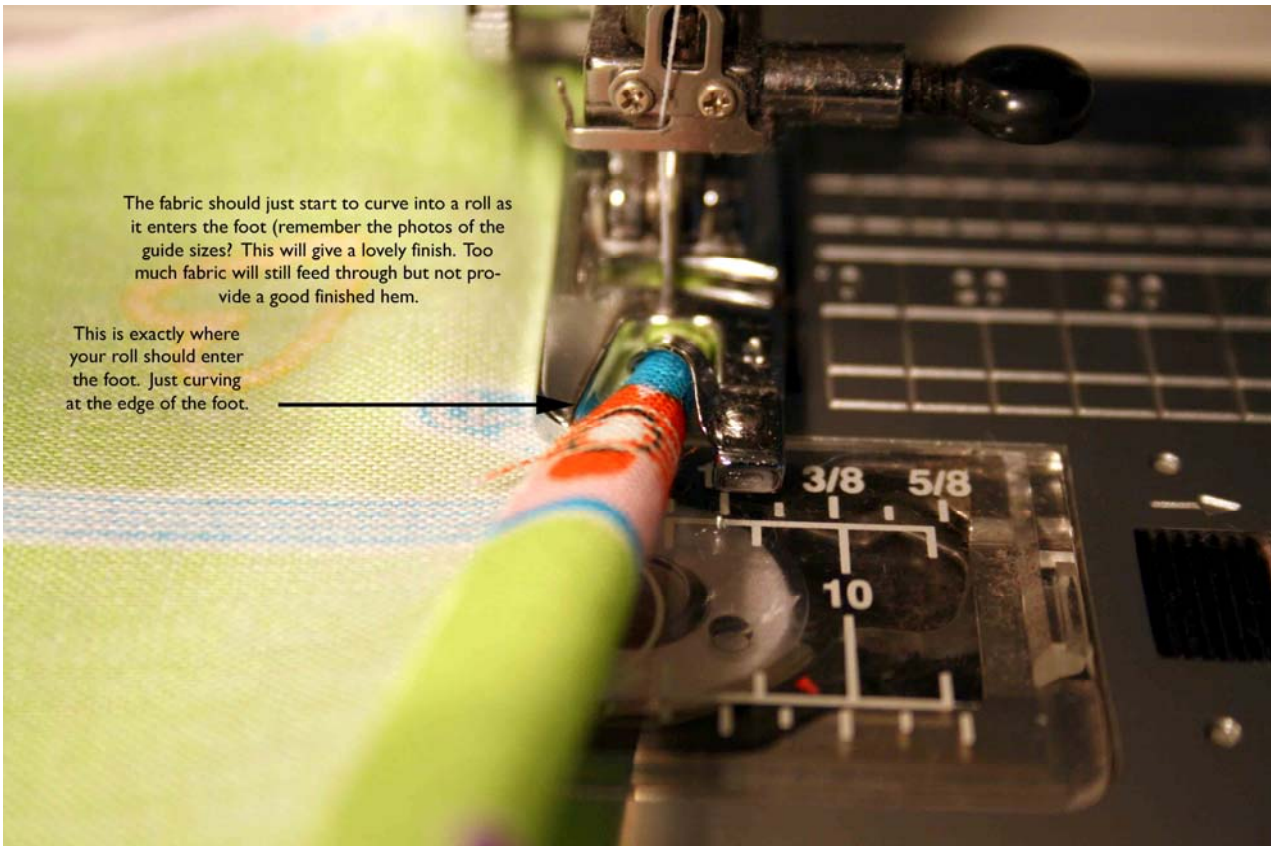
Feed the fabric into the 'roll' of the presser foot.



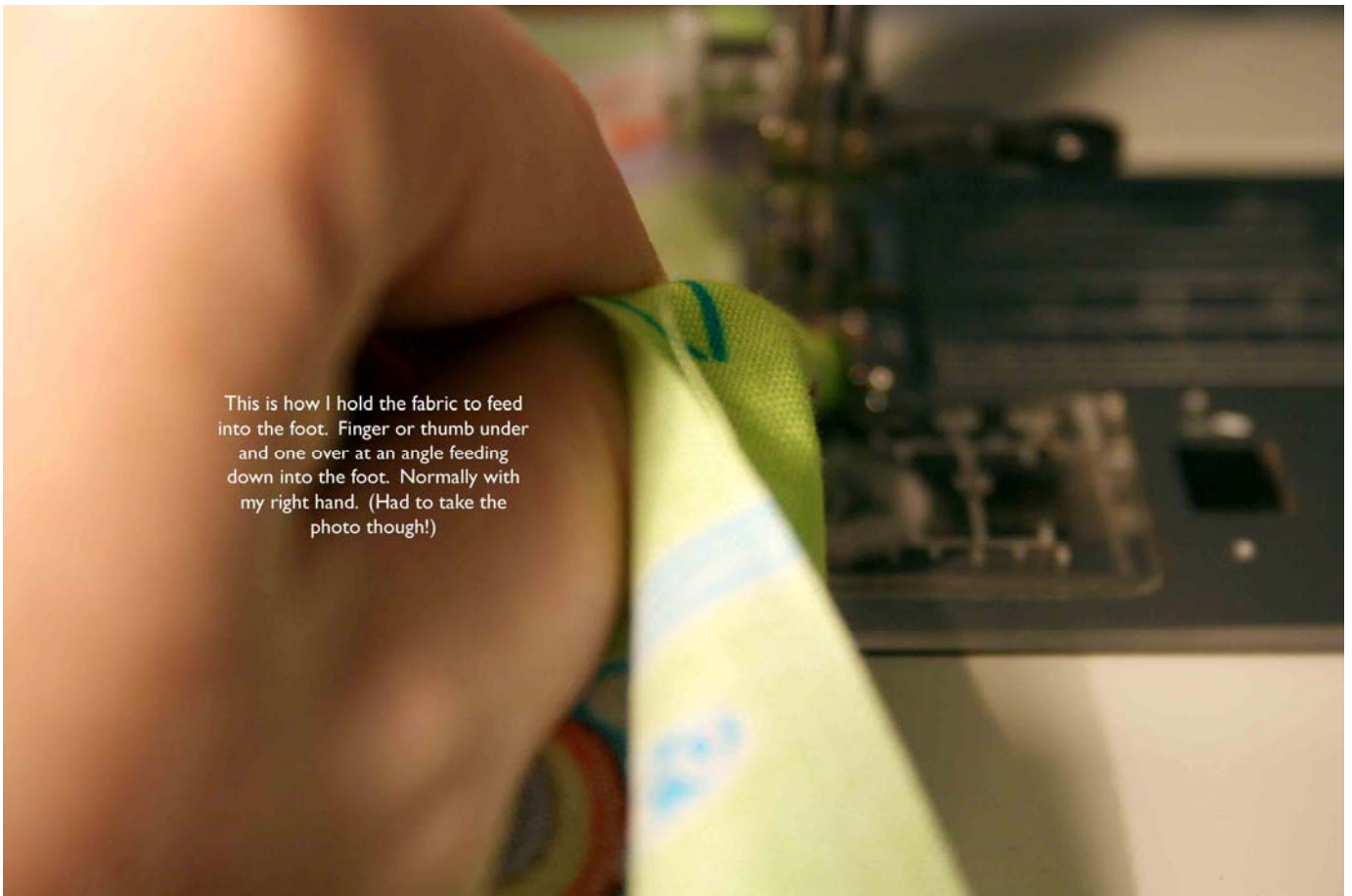
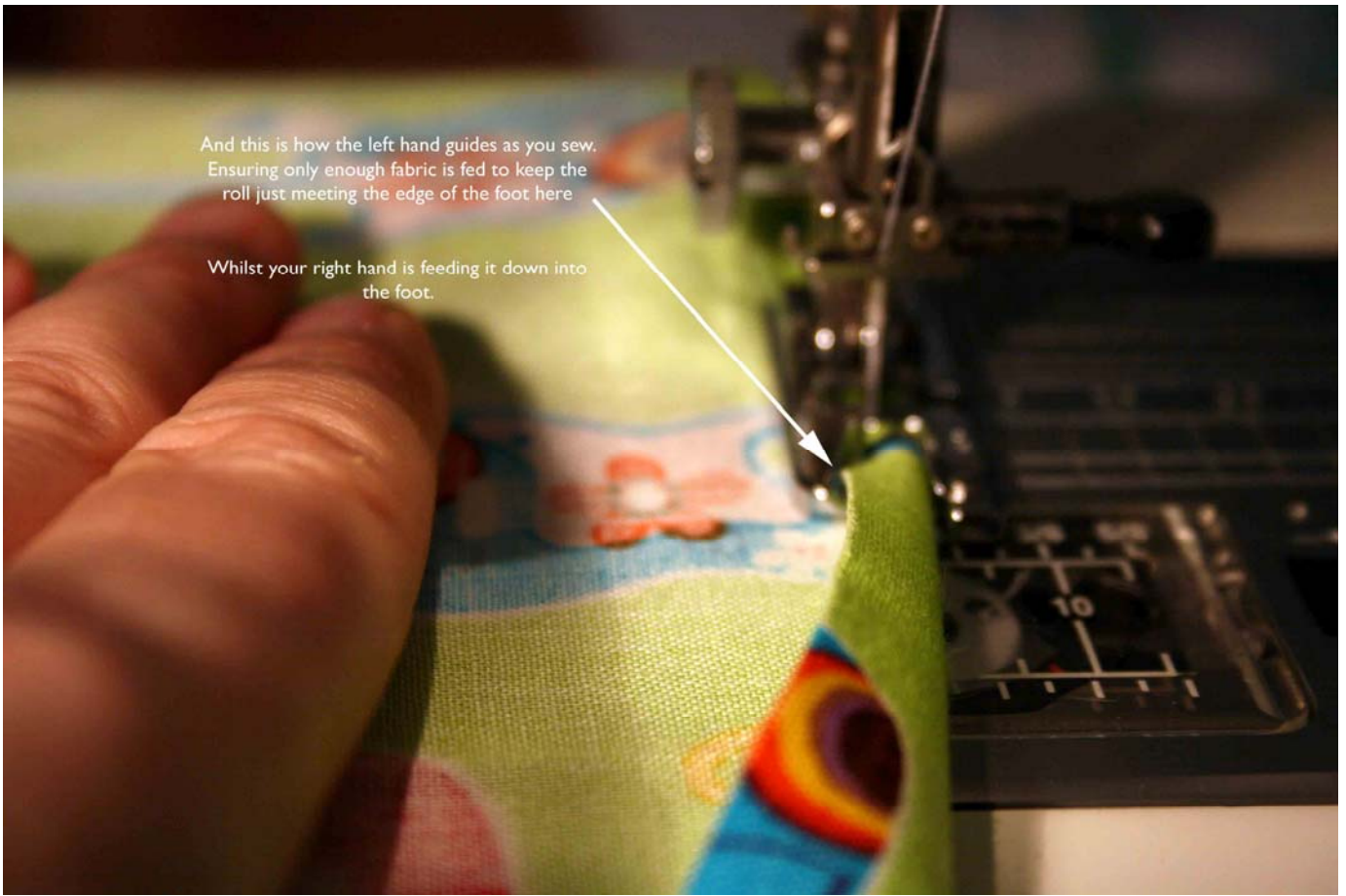
## Step 4

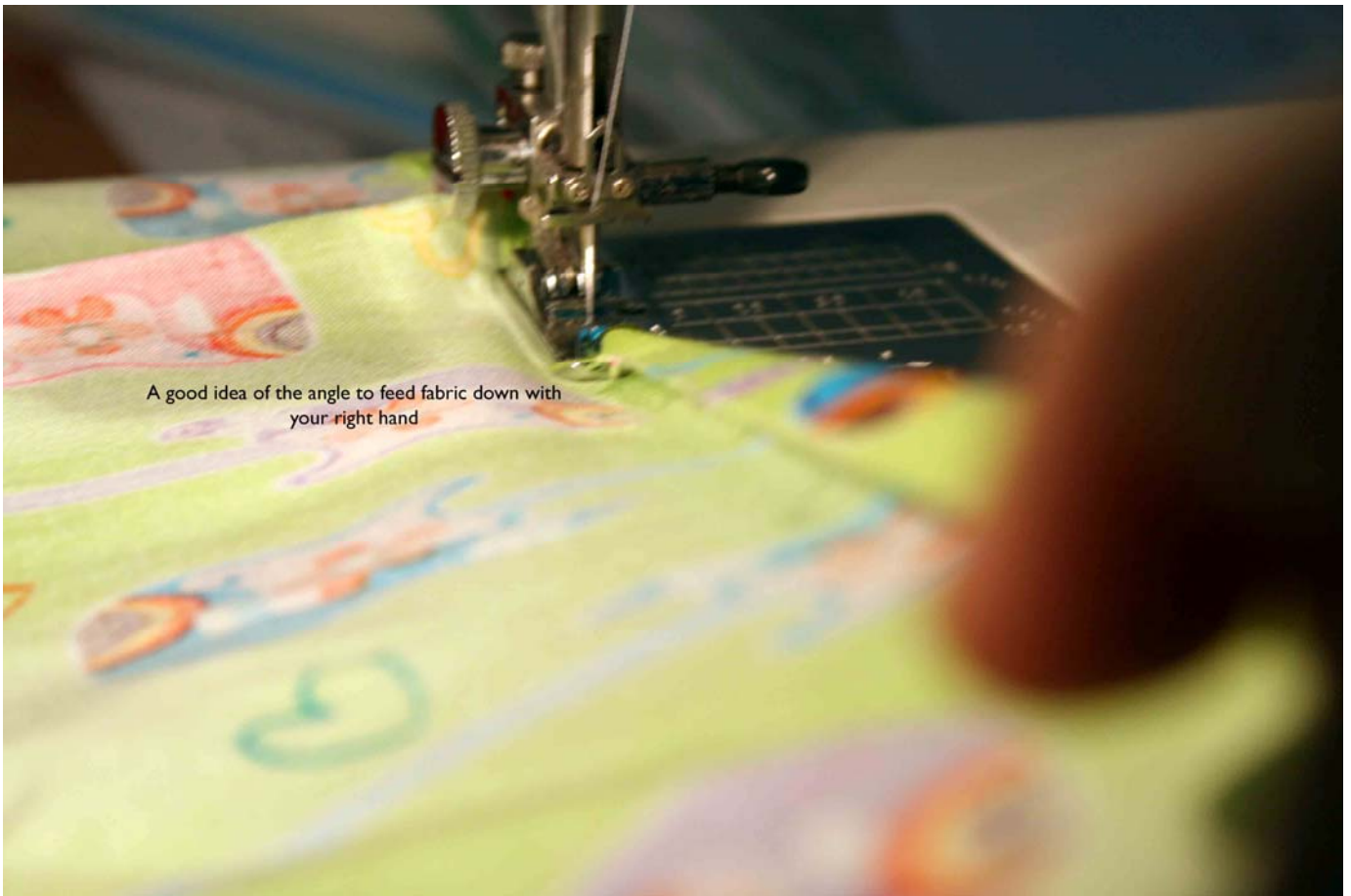
After lowering the foot, you will use both hands to guide the fabric as you start to sew. Slow and steady is good! See below for some tips on hand placement that I find easiest to guide the fabric.





The following 3 pictures show you what both hands will be doing as you sew.



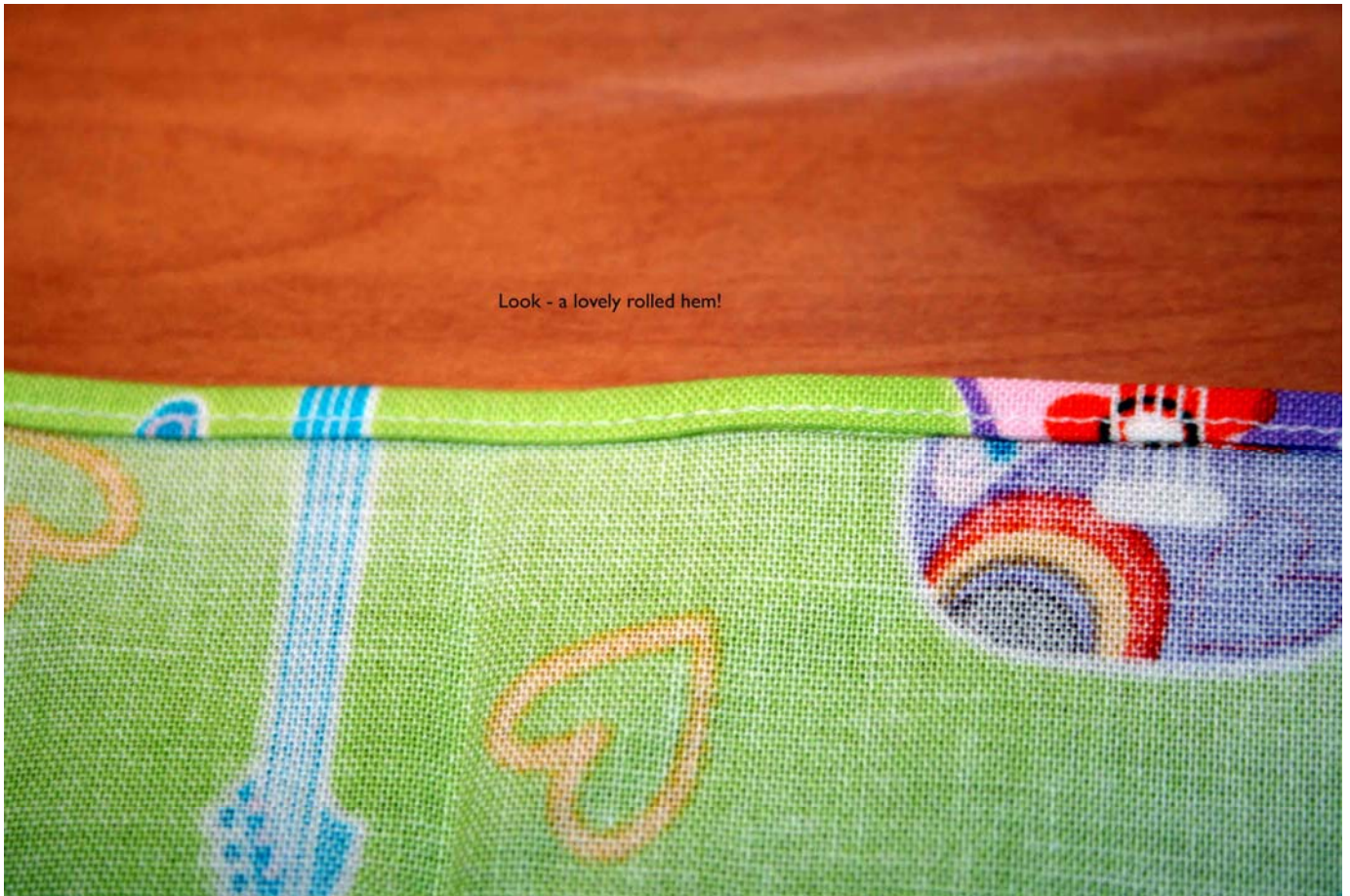


### Step 5

Have a look at the hem as it comes out the other end of your foot – lovely isn't it! The next picture illustrates closely how it looks when you get the fabric just 'rolling' into the curve of the top of the foot. If you have too much fabric being fed into the 'roll' there is an excess coming out the resulting hem and it will be bunched. This is something you should practice til you get it working well and you are comfortable. It is worth the effort!



Sew to the end and voila! Here is your pretty little Rolled Hem.
